Tim is a graduate of the National Fire Academy's executive fire officer program; a certified paramedic and EMS education coordinator for the Virginia Office of EMS; and an adjunct instructor for the Department of Fire Programs. He is a certified fire official and adjunct faculty member at J. Sargeant Reynolds Community College.

**Jeffrey Meyer:** Jeffrey is currently the emergency medical services manager for Portsmouth (VA) Fire, Rescue and Emergency Services. He has nearly 20 years of EMS experience in both volunteer and career agencies. He is a certified paramedic, and has served as an EMS field-training officer, EMS specialty team coordinator, EMS instructor, and regional EMS council director. Jeffrey has a bachelor's in healthcare administration and has completed an EMS fellowship in performance improvement and system design.

He served within the state and local emergency response field as a paramedic, firefighter, and hazardous materials technician in various volunteer and career departments across the Commonwealth, ultimately achieving the rank of battalion chief in the Hanover County (VA) Fire-EMS Department. While at the Virginia Department of Transportation, he conducted security reviews and improvement projects to better protect our infrastructure; and he served actively in the National Guard. Shawn has co-authored national level, interagency response protocols to large-scale incidents, responded to numerous regional and state level disasters, and presented at conferences on various homeland security topics. Shawn received a bachelor's degree from Virginia Tech and a master's degree from the Virginia Commonwealth University.

Joe Torrillo: Joe is a 25 year veteran of the New York City (NY) Fire Department and was promoted to lieutenant in 1996 after spending 15 years in Engine Company 10, across the street from the South Tower of the World Trade Center. While recuperating from a severe injury in 1996, he was assigned to light duty in the office of fire safety education. Eight months into this "light-duty" position, Joe was ultimately named the director of this public-based program and would later co-design a children's state-of-the-art fire safety learning center which opened in 2000. On the morning of 9/11, while on the way to a 9 a.m. press conference. Joe was minutes away from the World Trade Center when American Airlines Flight #11 struck the South Tower. Fearing for Engine Company and Ladder Companies 10, Joe diverted to the scene to render assistance. Three minutes after donning borrowed bunker gear, the second jet flew over Joe's head and slammed into the South Tower at 9:03 a.m. With a background in structural engineering, Joe made an immediate assessment that everyone above the fire was doomed to death, and that the buildings would collapse. While Joe was involved in the rescue operation, the South Tower fell and he was buried alive with a fractured skull, broken ribs, broken arm, crushed spine and heavy internal bleeding. Shortly after being found alive, he was removed and placed on the deck of a boat in the Hudson River. As emergency personnel were tending to his

care, the North Tower fell and buried Joe again in the engine room of the boat. After 45 minutes, he was once again rescued from the debris, and taken across the Hudson River to the Jersey City Trauma Center. Because he was wearing a borrowed set of turnout gear, Joe was misidentified, and was declared missing. By the time the sun set on the evening of 9/11, Joe had miraculously survived the collapse of both towers, however, he sustained life-long injuries. On February 21, 2004, Joe was officially retired from the New York City Fire Department as a result of his injuries.

**Bill Tricarico:** Bill is a senior risk management consultant for Emergency Services Insurance Program with nearly 40 years as a risk management consultant. In addition, he has over 25 years experience as a firefighter/EMT with the North Bellmore (NY) Fire Department. During his fire service tenure, he has held many positions including fire chief, and fire commissioner for the City of Cortland, NY. Bill is on the faculty of several fire service and EMS organizations, has spoken at many national conferences, and has been published in national fire and EMS periodicals. He also currently serves on three NFPA Technical Committees.

**Gary Umphlett**: Gary joined the Virginia Beach (VA) Fire Department in 1983 and was promoted to captain in 2007. During his tenure, he was chosen as the city's 2004 Hall of Fame Employee of the Year and the 2005 Firefighter of the Year. Over the years, Gary has assisted Stihl Inc. in developing and improving their safety apparel (chaps and helmet system) and was instrumental in developing the "460 Rescue Magnum Saw" which is utilized by firefighters all over the world in life saving endeavors. Jeremy is also an instructor and co-founder of Real Fire Training and has developed multiple programs emphasizing foundational fire ground operations and skills.
